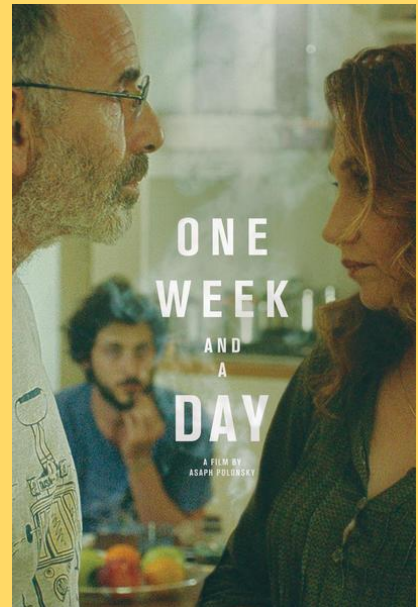
One Week and a Day

A week is hardly enough for Eyal and Vicky to mourn the loss of their 25-year-old son Ronni, and each reacts to the end of the Shiva in very different ways. Vicky abruptly kicks out her substitute and returns to teaching, while Eyal steals his late son's bag of medical marijuana. As the world refuses to stop turning and accommodate their grief, they find themselves acting out in outlandish ways to regain a sense of control over their lives.

According to Nick Allen (Roger Ebert Film Club), *One Week and a Day* is "an incredibly tactful tragicomedy from among a long list of movies about death, but one of the most original in recent memory, for its emotional delicacy in sparing us hollow, tear-gushing grandiosity, and for its attitude on life."
